

Rector's Report 2019

Regrets? I have a few, but then again, too few to mention... Don't worry, I'm not going to burst into song (the line above is from "My way" if you're wracking your brain), but this is my sixteenth and last annual report as Rector of Alwalton, Orton Wistow, Orton Northgate, Orton Southgate and Chesterton.

Admittedly, when I first started writing these reports they were "Team Vicar" reports and I suppose that reflects the changes that have taken place. St. Andrew's and St. Michael's were part of a larger team that was already in the process of disbanding when we arrived, then we joined together with three other local churches before eventually going back to being stand-alone parishes. In the most recent months we have become virtual churches meeting online through Zoom and Youtube. What an odd, exciting, ever changing church we are part of.

And now another change for you and for us – our family is moving over the border into Peterborough diocese and joining a group of parishes on the other side of Northampton so, in the not too distant future, another name will be added to the lists here of incumbents hanging in both churches – just for the sake of clarity, it's the lists that are hanging in the churches, not the incumbents!

So, the reign of Ingham is coming to an end? Well I hope not, because I hope that it hasn't been <u>my</u> "reign", rather I have always sought to be under the authority of Scripture and the sovereignty of God. Over the years it has been a privilege and an honour to serve as the incumbent of both parishes, to know you all and count you as my friends. To be a friend in return and to share our lives with you. But then, how they work all those things out with you in daily terms – well, that's the wonderful and exciting unknown. Enjoy the adventure.

Secretary's Report 2019

Electoral Roll – The number on the Electoral Roll is 80.

APCM – This was held in St Andrew's Church on Wednesday 10th April, 2019.

The PCC have met monthly apart from August, October and December. General business has been conducted, the following covers most of the year's activities. The Ministry Team had their first meeting in October.

Services – The average attendance is 45.

Activities - St Andrew's welcomed folk to a Lent lunch in March and there was an Easter craft afternoon. In May there was a Christian Aid Big Brekkie, and in June there was an International Bring & Share lunch for Pentecost. In July Helen Wordsworth came to a ladies' breakfast and shared how the Parish Nurses scheme is progressing. The Heritage Open Day in September again included a lunch for The Leprosy Mission. In October a Discipleship Explored course began. It was good to have The Prince of Peace choir from Kigali for a Sunday evening of praise and worship. The Light Party on 31st October included a film. At the beginning of November we received 46 shoe boxes for the Samaritan's Purse. In November we held a Tear Fund Quiz.

Thank you to everyone for taking part in the many aspects of life at St Andrew's. Praise the Lord for all his blessings.

Fabric notes for Annual report April 2019/20

The notice board: was refurbished- including new heading signage, seals and pin boards. This board is 20 years old and the oak wood is in superb condition. My thanks to David Alvey for help in removing this item (and for Dilys in putting it back up!)

Cost £156

Electrical work phase 1: The first phase included the fitting of an emergency light at the entrance, re-siting of sockets at the sound desk, checks for continuity in the south aisle lighting and a full five year test, including replacing relevant sockets with RCD trip devices.

A check was made of plugs/sockets at the same time and some fuse sizes were downgraded. No agreement was reached on improving the lighting in the chancel and north transept. Thus phase two is outstanding.

Electrical work phase 2: We hope to replace the lighting in the chancel and north transept with warm LED floodlights, and replace the heating in the toilet. The intention is to have warm LED lights throughout the church eventually.

Cost so far £750

The usual yearly preservation of external wood work has been carried out, the heating and organ have been serviced and the gutters cleared. Replacement ironwork has been fitted to the front gate. There has been no change to goods and ornaments, except a repair to one of the flower pedestals.

Cost £35

On completion of the electrical work no major inspections are due for at least the next four years.

On behalf of the PCC I want to thank you all for the support given over the year especially the work mornings and the regular effort in the grounds by David and Ian. Also for all the routine things that are carried out during the week with cleaning, flower arranging and by those providing coffee/teas. Your help is much appreciated in maintaining our ancient building and ensuring that there is a warm Christian presence.

Yaxley Deanery Synod 2019

In February, the synod met at Alwalton. Three people were licensed as Authorised Lay Ministers (ALM), and synod discussed and accepted the Deanery Plan.

In March, Rev. Anne Shorter retired from the parishes of Stanground and Farcet.

Orton Longueville hosted an Archdeacon's Visitation in June.

The June synod met at Chesterton, where Geoffrey Hunter, DAC Secretary and Head of Church Buildings and Pastoral Department, talked about REACH (Reimagining Churches as Community Assets for the Common Good). www.reachely.org

In September, Rev. Sarah Hare was licensed as vicar of Yaxley.

In October, Rev. Becky Dyball was licensed as vicar of Sawtry, Glatton, and Holme with Conington.

A few days later, Rev. Andrew and Rev. Carol Avery were licensed as vicar and pioneer minister for Stanground and Farcet.

Rev. Mark Pybus came to the Stilton/Elton group as curate.

The October meeting was at Haddon, where synod heard short testimonies from the new ministers in the deanery.

The Ministry Share target for 2019 was £288,753, which was paid in full; the target for 2020 is £306,000. There is currently an expected shortfall of £21,419. The Deanery continues to receive a large subsidy from the Diocese, to provide stipendiary ministry.
